The Youth Are "MEETING CHRIST "In Whippany, NJ

On Sunday, June 1, 2014 the youth of the New Jersey Protopresbyterate gathered (Deanery) at St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Church, Whippany, NJ for a Youth Gathering with the theme "Meeting Christ". There were about 85 young people, clergy, facilitators, and representatives of the women's religious orders, Missionary Sisters of Mother of God, Sisters Servants of Marv Immaculate, and Sisters of St. Basil the Great in attendance.

At the request of our

Metropolitan - Archbishop Stefan Soroka, and in keeping with the His Beatitude Sviatoslav Shevchuk's vision of a Vibrant Parish – 2020, the clergy gathered the youth from their respective parishes, age thirteen through college age, to participate in this first such gathering within the New Jersey Deanery. The response was overwhelmingly positive.

The first group arrived by bus from Assumption parish, Perth Amboy NJ, with twenty-four enthusiastic

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youngsters ready to register and begin their day. The youth from the northern parish of St. Nicholas, Passaic, NJ arrived by car and van and those from the southern parish of St. Josaphat, Trenton, NJ and all in between, began to file into the Cultural Center.

Following registration, they assembled in the gathering room to listen to the keynote speaker, Mr. Gerry Tchir. Mr. Tchir is currently President and CEO of Creative Solutions Unlimited, a professor at the Fairleigh Dickinson University, Rutherford N.J and the author of the book, "Dare to be Great". As he began his talk, he asked the participants to acknowledge the ministry of the clergy and the religious sisters with a big round of applause for their efforts. He also personally thanked members of the religious in serving Christ and their local parishes.

The young people listened attentively and were interactive with Mr. Tchir. "Most people equate greatness with money, power, and wealth," Mr. Tchir said, "but I offer the greatness that is much, much more; it is becoming a positive role model to everyone you meet; by demonstrating on a daily basis how you personally treat others; by living the Golden Rule, namely, "Doing unto others as you would have them do unto you." It is always treating people with dignity and respect, and never bullying anyone, and coming to the aid of someone in need of your help. As the future leaders of America and our Ukrainian American community, I challenge you to have the courage and wisdom to establish a new set of priorities for yourself by putting God first, family second, and others things next." He also shared the following note of inspiration with the audience: "I'd rather attempt to do something great and fail, then attempt to do nothing, and succeed."

Immediately following this presentation the youth proceeded to the church for Divine Liturgy, celebrated by NJ Dean, Very Rev. Joseph Szupa, Rev. Taras Lonchyna and Rev. Ivan Turyk. After the reading

of the Holy Gospel, Fr. Joseph greeted the young people and Fr. Ivan offered the homily. Using the image of "The Praying Hands" by Albrecht Durer, Fr. Ivan encouraged the youth to remain prayerful and to always find ways to draw closer to God. He pointed out that young people are both the present and the future of the church, and that by using their hands, lips and hearts, they must become involved in all levels of the church ministries, so that when leadership is passed on to them, they will not be found wanting and confused.

Lunch time came and as is the case with growing young people, they quickly lined up to be served a delicious luncheon. Afterwards they returned to the church to witness the play "Damien," based on the life of the late Fr. Damien, a Belgian Catholic priest who lived and served in the leper colony on the island of Molokai, Hawaii from 1873 to 1889, and who was canonized as a saint on 11 October 2009. The one-man play tells the story of Damien's life in the first person through a series of flashbacks and was presented by the renowned Broadway actor-turned-Ukrainian Catholic priest, Fr. Edward Evanko.

Returning to the Cultural Center, the participants were dispersed into age-appropriated discussion groups led by facilitators, to ponder and discuss the following questions: What do you find most difficult about the Christian life? Why do people go to Church? Why do you go? What do you think most young adults need from the Church or hope to get from the Church? If you could ask Christ to change one problem in the world today, what would you like him to change? How would your life be different if you knew Jesus was returning in six months time?

In the eight discussion groups, participants had the opportunity to express their own ideas about their involvement in Church life, and grow deeper in their faith by meeting and interacting with other Catholic youth from different parishes. After the discussions, each individual was asked to complete a survey

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related to the day's program. The primary aim of the survey was to better understand young people in the church today, the depth of their faith, and their involvement with church life. The goal of the NJ Deanery is to use the information gathered to develop appropriate programs and activities in their respective parishes that are engaging, and speak to the needs of the youth.

Afterwards, refreshments were served and the closing of the Youth Gathering took place. Mrs. Jaroslava Lonchyna wrote a song for the occasion - "Put Your Hand" and the young people, seated in a large circle around the room with an icon of Christ in their midst, listened and sang along. Here again the theme of "hands" reaching out to Christ and to one another echoed through. Following the 'sing-along', Right Reverend Mitred Protopresbyter Roman Mirchuk, who graciously hosted the gathering in his parish, came forward, stood before the Icon, and requested that everyone stand and hold hands. Then Fr. Roman asked each one to pass on the "spark" of Christ to each other. The "spark" was passed on from Fr. Roman from his right hand and was returned to his left hand. Then again to reinforce the presence of Christ, it was passed from his left hand and was returned to his right hand. A closing prayer of Thanksgiving was offered, and afterwards everyone got ready for the Volleyball matches. The youth winners of the initial matches were matched against the New Jersey Deanery clergy present. It

was quite a game, especially when the Youth beat the Clergy by a very close score. Prizes were awarded to the youth winners. As the day concluded, the attendees slowly began to depart, leaving with new friends, and a renewed understanding of their relationship with Christ, and with each other.

By all accounts it was an awesome event that enriched the lives and faith of so many young people. The clergy of the NJ Deanery thank all the parents of the youth for allowing them to participate at this first-ever gathering. They also thank the volunteers, facilitators and especially Marion C. Hrubec and Helen Fedoriw, members of the League of Ukrainian Catholics of America, LUC, for help in organizing the event. The combined efforts of so many gifted God loving people, helped to make the 2014 New Jersey Ukrainian American Catholic Youth Gathering a meaningful, faith-building and faith-strengthening gathering of our youth, our future church, in the presence of God.

Nativity of St. John the Baptist - June 24

In the time of Herod king of Judea there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly division of Abijah; his wife Elizabeth was also a descendant of Aaron. Both of them were righteous in the sight of God, observing all the Lord's commands and decrees blamelessly. But they were childless because Elizabeth was not able to conceive, and they were both very old. Once when Zechariah's division was on duty and he was serving as priest before God, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood, to go into the temple of the Lord and burn incense. And when the time for the burning of incense came, all the assembled worshipers were praying outside. Then an angel of the Lord appeared to him, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. When Zechariah saw him, he was startled and was gripped with fear. But the angel said to him: "Do not

be afraid, Zechariah; your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you are to call him John. He will be a joy and delight to you, and many will rejoice because of his birth, for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He is never to take wine or other fermented drink, and he will be filled with the Holy Spirit even before he is born. He will bring back many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. And he will go on before the Lord, in the spirit and power of Elijah, to turn the hearts of the parents to their children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous—to make ready a people prepared for the Lord." Zechariah asked the angel, "How can I be sure of this? I am an old man and my wife is well along in years." The angel said to him, "I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you and to tell you this good news. And now you will be silent and not able to speak until the day this happens, because you did not believe my words, which will come true at their appointed time." Meanwhile, the people were waiting for Zechariah and wondering why he stayed so long in the temple. When he came out, he could not speak to them. They realized he had seen a vision in the temple, for he kept making signs to them but remained unable to speak. When his time of service was completed, he returned home. After this his wife Elizabeth became pregnant and for five months remained in seclusion. "The Lord has done this for me," she said. "In these days he has shown his favor and taken away my disgrace among the people." When it was time for Elizabeth to have her baby, she gave birth to a son. Her neighbors and relatives heard that the Lord had shown her great mercy, and they shared her joy. On the eighth day they came to circumcise the child, and they were going to name him after his father Zechariah, but his mother spoke up and said, "No! He is to be called John." They said to her, "There is no one among your relatives who has that name." Then they made signs to his father, to find out what he would like to name the child. He asked for a writing tablet, and to everyone's astonishment he wrote, "His name is John." Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue set free, and he began to speak, praising God. All the neighbors were filled with awe, and throughout the hill country of Judea people were talking about all these things. Everyone who heard this wondered about it, asking, "What then is this child going to be?" For the Lord's hand was with him. His father Zechariah was filled with the Holy Spirit and prophesied: "Praise be to the Lord, the God of Israel, because he has come to his people and redeemed them. And you, my child, will be called a prophet of the Most High; for you will go on before the Lord to prepare the way for him, to give his people the knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, by which the rising sun will come to us from heaven to shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace." And the child grew and became strong in spirit; and he lived in the wilderness until he appeared publicly to Israel. (Lk. 1: 5-25, 57-68, 76-80)

On June 24 we commemorate the birth of St. John the Baptist. While all of us know the exact date of our birthday, we really do not know the exact date of John's birthday. It is celebrated

on this day according to ancient custom.

The celebration of John's birthday is based on a quotation from John's Gospel: "He (Jesus) must increase and I (John the Baptist) must decrease." So, just as the days increase in length until late December, so does the importance of John the Baptist decrease. And just as the days increase in length after Christmas,

so does the importance of Jesus increase.

The importance of anyone's birthday, however, no matter how it is calculated, can only be understood

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by looking back after that person's death to the accomplishments of his or her life.

For example, we celebrate the birthday of George Washington, not because he was born but because of what he accomplished after his birth and during his life. The same is true of Abraham Lincoln.

So, what do we look back to in the life of John the Baptist? The first thing the readings tell us about the importance of John is that he was called by name while in the womb of his mother. "Before I formed vou in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you." "Elizabeth shall bear a son whom you shall name John." "The Lord called me from birth, from my mother's womb he gave me my name." On the eighth day after his birth his father and mother said, "He is to be called John."

Looking back, after his death, through his life, we see that John's mission was to be the one who prepared the way for the Messiah. John was to be a forerunner - one who ran ahead and got everything ready. God gave John the words to speak in order to accomplish his mission.

"To whomever I send you, you shall go; whatever I command you, you shall speak. See, I place my words in your mouth!"

John preached a baptism of repentance, a baptism of preparation. He called for a turning around from old ways, a "rooting up and tearing down," a "destroying and demolishing," and an acceptance of new ways of "building and planting."

Looking back through his life, we come to see that John knew his place in God's plan. Paul says in the Acts of the Apostles, "As John's career was coming to an end, he would say, 'What you suppose me to be I am not. Rather, look for the one who comes after me. I am not worthy to unfasten the sandals of his feet'."

John was the precursor. He was not the Messiah but the Messiah's prophet. This was his function. This was his importance.

celebrating John's In birthday, we see that we have a lot to learn from this saint. In remembering his birthday, we realize that his role in God's plan is also our role. The Church and every member of it is a John the Baptizer, who calls the world to prepare the way for the coming of the Gospel of Jesus. All of us have been called by name the day of our new birth through waters of baptism. On that day we

turned from the world of sin and set straight on the highway to God.

We were anointed as prophets to preach by the way we live. In this way point toward the Messiah. We were given a candle and told that we were lights to light the way for others to Jesus, the light of the world. If we submit to our role in God's plan, however, and become like John, God will extend His hand and touch our mouths. He will say, "With My help you can be the prophet I have called you to be in preparing the world for My son, Jesus." Someday every one of us will die. Will anyone celebrate our birthday because we prepared the way for the Gospel of the Messiah? Happy birthday, John the Baptist! You challenge us to be who we have been called to be!

that was greater He than all who are born of women, the Prophet who received God's testimony that he surpassed all the Prophets, was born of the aged and barren Elizabeth (Luke 1:7) and filled all his kinsmen, and those that lived round about, with aladness and wonder. But even more wondrous was that which followed on the eighth day when he was circumcised, that is, the day on which a male child

receives his name.

Those present called him Zacharias, the name of his father. But the mother said, "Not so, but he shall be called John." Since the child's father was unable to speak, he was asked, by means of a sign, to indicate the child's name. He then asked for a tablet and wrote, "His name is John."

And immediately Zacharias' mouth was opened, his tongue was loosed from its silence of nine months, and filled with the Holy Spirit, he blessed the God of Israel, Who had fulfilled the promises made to their fathers, and had visited them that were sitting in darkness and the shadow of death, and had sent to them the light of salvation.


Zacharias prophesied concerning the child also, saying that he would be a Prophet of the Most High and Forerunner of Jesus Christ. And the child John, who was filled with grace, grew and waxed strong in the Spirit; and he was in the wilderness until the day of his showing to Israel (Luke 1:57-80). His name is a variation of the Hebrew "Johanan," which means "Yahweh is gracious."

PCC Article - June 2014 Seeking the Gateways Out of Poverty

There is an oft-repeated parable that goes something like this:

One day a group of villagers was working in the fields by a river. Suddenly someone noticed a baby floating downstream. A woman rushed out and rescued the baby, brought it to shore and cared for it. During the next several more days, babies floating were found downstream, and the villagers rescued them as well. But before long there was a steady stream of babies floating towards them.

Soon the whole village was involved in the many tasks of rescue work: pulling these poor children out of the stream, ensuring they were properly fed, clothed, and housed, and integrating them into the life of the village.

Before long, however, the village became exhausted with all this rescue work. Some villagers suggested they go upstream to discover how all these babies were getting into the river in the first place. Had a mysterious illness stricken these poor children? Had the shoreline been made unsafe by an earthquake? Was some hateful person throwing them in deliberately? Was an even more exhausted village upstream abandoning them out of hopelessness?

"Don't you see," cried some, "if we find out how they're getting in the river, we can stop the problem and no babies will drown? By going upstream we can eliminate the cause of the problem!" (Credit: Bread for the World)

One group of state legislators is similarly concerned about the "rescue work" being done in Pennsylvania to address the effects of poverty. The House Majority Policy Committee commissioned a study to identify barriers that lowincome Pennsylvanians face when attempting to reach self-sufficiency. In April 2014, the committee released the preliminary findings of their Beyond Poverty report.

"Government spends nearly a trillion dollars annually on programs to fight poverty, yet there are still 1.6 million Pennsylvanians struggling to make ends meet," said Representative Dave Reed (R-Indiana), chairman of the policy committee. "Clearly we must readjust our focuses."

Twelve barriers were identified: the breakdown of family support systems, lack of child care, the downturn in the economy, inaccessible health care, criminal records, financial illiteracy, inadequate education, homelessness. mental health issues, hunger, substance abuse, lack of transportation, and a "benefits cliff" where upward movement in an economic bracket results in loss off services before a family is able to provide for them independently.

Identifying barriers that entrap families in poverty is the first step of the Empowering **Opportunities:** Gateways Out of Poverty initiative that seeks to establish effective and sustainable solutions to poverty in the Commonwealth. The report will inform the committee's next steps of building partnerships among community organizations, educators, job creators, and state government; developing comprehensive solutions to help families transition out of poverty; and maintaining a long-term outlook that promotes progress and facilitates growth.

The Gospel implores us to care for the poor. As long time advocates for policies that support those in need, the Pennsylvania Catholic Conference will be closely watching the work of the Empowering Opportunities initiative. We pray that the House Majority Policy Committee's venture to go "upstream" will be fruitful in identifying effective gateways out of poverty.

Over the last six months of many YOU have closely followed events Ukraine-dramatic, in sometimes tragic, but ultimately life-giving. centurv After a of genocidal experiences and decades of rampant corruption and crushing social injustice, the Ukrainian nation has been on an extended, inspired pilgrimage from fear and fraud to dignity and integrity.

Through frigid winter months millions of people filled the squares of our cities and also your cities to manifest their desire for a better life. All Ukrainian Churches and religious organizations stood together. For months with one voice they insisted that the president and government respect their citizens. that violence is not the answer, that dividing society and the country is immoral, and that dialogue is the only

manner legitimate to resolve the political and social crisis. We are grateful for this prophetic unity to all our brothers and sisters in faith, Roman Catholics, to Protestants, Jews. Muslims and especially the Orthodox Churches of Ukraine.

We are very grateful for your efforts to inform your communities about the real nature of changes which are taking place in our country, in contrast to the skewed information which is directed against Ukraine and its Churches, especially against the Ukrainian Greek-Catholic Church.

In such words the members of UGCC Permanent Synod of Bishops in their letter expressed gratitude to the Catholic Episcopal Conferences, clergy, monastic orders, and laity of the Church, all Christians and people of goodwill for their solidarity with Ukraine throughout the events which took place in the last few months. "In recent days we have seen how this campaign has escalated (the spreading of untruthful information – author) from certain political and spiritual authorities of the highest level, who share an aggressive tone and the technique of misrepresentation," states the document.

Synod members contend that after a century of genocide and decades of fierce corruption and an intolerable social injustice, "the Ukrainian nation remains in an on-going inspired pilgrimage from fear and fraud towards dignity and integrity."

For months they insisted that the president and the government have to respect their citizens, that violence is intolerable, that the division of society and the nation is amoral, and that dialogue is the only legitimate manner towards resolving political and social crisis," - states the letter which, in the name of the Permanent Synod, was signed by His Beatitude Sviatoslav.

UGCC Bishops expressed their gratitude for "this prophetic unity" to all the brothers and sisters who share a faith: Roman-Catholics, Protestants, Jews, Muslim, and especially the representatives of the Orthodox Churches in Ukraine.

Authors of the letter constitute that in joining the peaceful demonstrations, in answer to the total corruption and persecution from the government, and the intolerable social conditions, millions of Ukrainians are cultivating a much greater inter-ethnic, inter-confessional and inter-cultural solidarity.

"The whole world was convinced that Ukraine is the home of numerous nationalities and religions, which coexist peacefully; their renewed civic society protects its country and the general welfare. Together Ukrainian citizens have voiced their "NO" to tyranny, lack of law, violence, and irresponsibility, personal or social, inner or external, both inside the country as well as in the international sphere," reads the document.

The bishops ask for continued prayers for peace in Ukraine, for a peace and a reconciliation based on justice. "Your benevolence towards Ukraine contains the power of transfiguration; it is an enormous support for our people on their pilgrimage route," emphasize UGCC bishops in the letter "Ukraine on a pilgrimage -- thank you that you are together with us!"

Permanent Synod members also sent special words of aratitude to His Holiness Pope Francis "who supported us in his prayers and appealed for peace and justice in Ukraine."

The sixty-fourth session of the Synod of Bishops of the Kyiv - Galician Major Archbishopric of the UGCC

Tuesday, 17 June 2014

The sixty-fourth session of the Synod of Bishops of the Kyiv-Galician Major Archbishopric of the UGCC was held on 13-14 June 2014 in the Marian Spiritual Centre in Zarvanytsya.

The Synod was attended by all the Greek-Catholic bishops serving in Ukraine and nominated Bishop Josaphat (Moschych) proclaimed as the auxiliary bishop of Ivano-Frankivsk archdiocese.

Before the start of the Synodal meetings, α seminar on ecumenism (the movement for unity among Christians) took place and it was conducted by the Rev. Shaban. Dr.lgor The same issue was also the main theme of this session of the Synod.

finalized Synod and approved the Regulations on the status and ministry of the bishop ministered the Kyiv-Galician in Major Archbishopric of the UGCC and adopted in the first reading the Pastoral adviser "Calling to the laity to participate in social and political life of the country" and the Model Statute of the parish, which were

provided under the Rev. Dr.Mykhaylo Mel'nyk and the Rev.Dr.Vitaliy Tokar. Synod also approved amendments to the Regulation on the parish catechetical school and Regulations on the procedure for appointment to the catechetical ministry and withdrawal from it.

Synod fathers in this session also examined the issue of exorcism and prayers for healing for the laity and priests, that were reported by father Jehoshaphat Savran.

In the economic and financial block of issues presented were the results of extensive audit and the report on the activities based by the UGCC Non-state pension fund "Pokrova", stated the need for learning of the faithful the basics of financial and economic literacy. There were also discussed other issues of financial and economic life of the Church, in particular the activity of Patriarchal pilgrimage center, reported by Father Lyubomyr Yavorskyi.

In addition to the above, it was considered a good preparation for the celebration of the 25th anniversary of

the legalization of the UGCC in Ukraine and the Ukrainian program of this year's pilgrimage to Zarvanytsya that will devoted be to celebration. this The program was presented Ternopil-Zboriv bv Metropolitan Vasyl (Semenyuk), the governor of Marian Spiritual centre in Zarvanytsya.

About the Major Archbishopric Comission activity and commissions recent publications reported Fr.Petro Rak, the Head of the church committees. About the activity of Bureau of Kyiv-Galician Major Archbishopric of the UGCC in the matter of new religious movements reported its President Anna Eva Bodnar.

Members of the Synod of Bishops of the Kyiv Galician Major Archbishopric of the UGCC, having learnt of the tragic death of our 49 soldiers by hands of the terrorists in Lugansk. assured of continued prayers for the souls of all the deads and expressed their condolences to the bereaved and relatives of the deads in a plane shot down by terrorists, and all the relatives of those who in last month gave their lives for freedom and a better future for our country.

The sixty- fifth Session of the Synod of Bishops of the Kyiv-Galician Major Archbishopric of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church was decided to hold in November 2014.
